

DECEMBER 5, 1974

The City Council of the City of Idaho Falls met in regular meeting, Thursday, December 5, 1974, at 7:30 P.M. in the Council chambers in Idaho Falls, Idaho. There were present at said meeting, Mayor S. Eddie Pedersen, Councilmen Jim Freeman, Mel Erickson, Ralph Wood, Gill Karst, Paul Hovey, and Norris Gesas. Also present: Roy C. Barnes, City Clerk; Arthur Smith, City Attorney; John Evans, City Controller; Lorna Coughlin, City Treasurer; Robert Pollock, Police Chief; Les Corcoran, Fire Chief; Lee Mundell, Personnel Director; Chad Stanger, General Services Director; Don Lloyd, Public Works Director; Steve Harrison, Electrical Engineer.

Minutes of the last regular meeting, held November 21st, 1974, were read and approved.

Noting that Mr. Norris Hendrickson was present in the Council chambers and noting, further, that the Police Chief and the City Attorney had, at the last regular Council meeting, been assigned to investigate the operation of a mini-bus which had recently been unveiled and placed into service, the Mayor turned to City Attorney Smith for a report. Mr. Smith said that the Police Chief, after interviewing Mr. Jack Viggers of the Eastern Idaho Special Services, had every reason to conclude that this mini-bus was the beginning of an ambitious service contemplated by that agency. Smith concluded by saying he was given the impression that said mini-bus would serve anyone over 60 years of age or disabled, that no charge would be made but that a donation would be expected. Continuing with the impression as conveyed, Smith said it was the understanding that the bus would not be going on a regular route but that it would serve on a call basis and go house-to-house. With this understanding, Smith had interpreted the service as one requiring a license which, in turn, would have required vehicle inspection; all of this, not for revenue but in behalf of the health, welfare and safety of those affected by said service. Smith continued by saying that this entire interpretation had very recently changed after an interview with Mr. Tim Hopkins and Mrs. Dori Wakeman, Attorney and Director, respectively, for the Senior Citizen Community Center. Smith said he learned from that very reliable source that the mini-bus in question was acquired from donations and was owned and operated by that organization and that there was no connection between the Senior Citizens Community Center and Mr. Viggers and/or the Eastern Idaho Special Services. Smith said he learned, further, that this bus, other than delivering meals to the center, would serve primarily, as time permitted, to carry senior citizens from their place of residence at the center. Only senior citizens properly registered with the center would be entitled to this service. Mr. Smith concluded his remarks by saying that these most recent findings would cause him to revise his legal opinion to the effect that this particular mini-bus, as long as it was used as most recently described and not serving the public per se, would not require licensing, any more than a private citizen, running errands for the elderly would need a license. Smith said, however, that the City should oblige by issuing a license if requested by the Community Center, with or without fee, and this would not be beyond the realm of possibility that the center might want to license the vehicle from the standpoint of health, safety and welfare.

Asked for comment, Police Chief Pollock appeared briefly to say that Mr. Viggers has filed for a Federal Grant for three mini-busses which, as if and when delivered, would be operated by the Eastern Idaho Special Services but this should not have any bearing in the Council's decision pertaining to the mini-bus operated by the Community Center. In answer to a question by a Councilman, Smith said that if the Council determines no need for a license for the mini-bus in question, then there would be no justification for the other requirements that normally accompany a license such as liability insurance or vehicle inspection. Councilman Karst asked if the City should be concerned about possible damage to the local cab company. Smith said that, under the circumstances, he could not see how damage could be incurred. He said he would strongly recommend however, that the Police Chief check, occasionally, to see that the mini-bus was being used for the purpose as intended.

Mr. Hendrickson then appeared briefly before the Council to say that this was a welcome report except it could be pretty well concluded that the problem will again arise when the other busses get into operation. He said he had always been concerned about the Senior Citizens and a service of this nature, if confined, would be of valuable service. He said the news coverage on this matter suggested something other than this most recent report and if subsidized, mini-busses were ever used to compete with private enterprise it would become everyone's problem, inasmuch as it would result in higher fares by those using the privately owned cab service. It was the general consensus of all Councilmen that no further action was required at this time except to instruct the Police Chief to exercise continuous vigilance on this mini-bus operation.

Mrs. Doris Backstrom, representing the Upper Snake Valley Historical Society, appeared before the Council and invited the Mayor and all Councilmen to attend an organizational meeting of that organization on January 6th, 1975, at the Skyline High School at 7:00 P.M. At that time, she continued, slides would be presented depicting museums of other cities and it was the wish and the hope of the local Society that such a museum could be founded in this City. She noted that there was in existence a section in the Idaho Code which provided for museums and for a tax levy to fund same. She said the old library building has been suggested to serve in that capacity and is looked upon with favor by the Society. She said certain local civic groups have been approached on this matter and have indicated an interest. The Mayor thanked Mrs. Backstrom for her appearance and this invitation and commended her for her civic interest.

Bills for the month of November, 1974, having been properly audited by the Fiscal Committee, were presented. The City Clerk was asked to read aloud all fund totals for salaries, materials and services, as follows:

This damage claim was presented and read aloud:

NOTICE OF CLAIM

Ron Thomas, of 2930 South Yellowstone Highway, Idaho Falls, Idaho, does hereby give notice of claim and make claim against the City of Idaho Falls for damages incurred by him as a result of the actions of the Police Department of the City of Idaho Falls.

That on Saturday, the 30th day of November, 1974, the City Police Department of Idaho Falls did enter upon the property owned by the claimant, Ron Thomas, located at 348 First Street, in Idaho Falls, Idaho, which the claimant operates as an apartment unit.

That pursuant to an arrest made by the Police Department, the officers approached apartment number 9 at said location and did intentionally and willfully destroy the door to apartment number 9 by kicking or ramming against the wooden door, causing the door to splinter and break beyond repair. Claimant was thereby required to replace said door at a cost to him of \$38.00,

together with the additional cost of \$10.00 which was expended for the service to install said door.

Therefore, claimant respectfully makes demand upon the City of Idaho Falls to pay him the sum of \$58.00, representing the amount of the structural damage to the door, the installation cost for said door, and an additional sum of \$10.00 which claimant was required to expend as attorney fee for the preparation of this claim.

It was moved by Councilman Hovey, seconded by Gesas, that this contract agreement be accepted and the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to sign. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

By memo, the Personnel Director asked for authorization to advertise for bids on employee group medical and dental and group life insurance. It was moved by Councilman Karst, seconded by Freeman, that authorization be granted to advertise for bids as indicated. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 5; No, none; carried. Councilman Erickson, abstaining.

Attached is the annual list of unpaid utility accounts which this office is recommending be charged off as totally uncollectable. With no exception, these have been on the books for four years and have been in the hands of a professional collector during that period. They consist, for the most part, of skips, people with no assets, deceased persons, or bankrupt. It should be mentioned that we have not served any of these customers with utility service during that four year period. We do not make a practice of turning accounts to

The list totals \$14,453.18. Total billed revenue in 1970 was in the amount of \$3,765,523. This represents a charged off percentage of .38%. We ask your authorization to charge off these accounts as recommended.

By memo, the Parks and Recreation Director requested authorization for the City Attorney and the Right-of-Way Agent to proceed with the acquisition of needed property within this Park development. It was moved by Councilman Freeman, seconded by Erickson, that the City Attorney be authorized and directed to obtain options on said property until funds are available. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

Noting from the agenda that several traffic recommendations from the Traffic Safety Committee were about to be considered and acknowledging the fact that some of these had to do with traffic signalization, the Mayor invited Mr. Ed Turner, Traffic Engineer to submit a slide presentation, particularly for the benefit of the news media, to substantiate the fact that traffic signals may not be installed without considerable investigation. Turner first drew attention to the manual on Uniform Traffic Control Laws for streets and highways and the fact that the Idaho Motor Vehicle Law dictates that all Governmental agencies must follow said manual. Turner listed eight warrants, at least one of which must be in evidence to justify signalization, as follows: Minimum vehicle volume, interruption of continuous traffic, minimum pedestrian volume, school crossings, progressive movement, accident experiences, systems or a combination of all of these. He showed the advantages and the disadvantages of traffic signals. Two types of traffic signals were noted; namely, pre-timed and traffic actuated. Turner then gave a brief explanation of the signal mechanical requirements, as required by the manual and the fact that advance engineering data was necessary including vehicle count, pedestrian count, approach speed, intersection count, etc. He said the latter became quite involved as a separate count is taken on all right hand turns, left turns and straight through traffic, over a twelve hour period. Noting that one of the traffic signal recommendations to be considered was at First and Woodruff. Turner reported that it doesn't warrant such a light based on count but, does warrant based on traffic accidents. Noting that another recommendation was to be forthcoming on 17th and Woodruff, he said that, based upon count this intersection was very close to a warrant, more so, in fact than 17th and St. Clair. Councilman Erickson expressed appreciation for this presentation. The City Attorney volunteered an observation to the effect that, if the City were to grossly disregard the manual in its traffic decisions, it could be named as defendant in the event of a serious accident and legal action.

The afore-mentioned traffic recommendations were then submitted, as follows:

SUBJECT: TRAFFIC RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations are submitted for your consideration.

1. In reply to the referral of a petition for traffic signals at Boulevard and 8th Street. It is suggested that the school crossing flip type signs reducing speed from 35 MPH to 20 MPH during the hours of 8 A.M. to 4 P.M., on school days, be suspended with blinking amber lights south of 9th Street and north of 5th Street with adequate signing denoting a school crossing zone within the four (4) block area with painted crosswalks at 5th, 7th and 9th Streets.
2. In reply to the referral of a petition for traffic signals at 17th Street and St. Clair Avenue. It is suggested this not be considered at this time. However, it is suggested that money for traffic signals for 17th and Woodruff be included within the 1975 Budget. When these signals are installed the school children could then cross 17th and Woodruff in place of St. Clair, releasing the crossing guard and the flip type signs presently being used.
3. It is suggested that money for traffic signals for 1st Street and Woodruff be included within the 1975 budget. During the interim period it is suggested we try a 4-way STOP at this intersection.
4. It is suggested we try a 4-way STOP at the intersection of 7th Street and Tiger Avenue.
5. Denial of request for a 4-way STOP at the intersection of Jefferson and Elva.
6. Denial of request for a 4-way STOP at the intersection of Emerson and Garfield.
7. Denial of request for angle parking on west side of Memorial Drive from South Temple to "E" Street.
8. Grant permission to School District No. 91 to attach "School Bus Stop" signs to approximately 50 street sign poles.
9. Adoption of ordinance stating speed limit within the City be 25 MPH unless otherwise posted. This is leaving the arterials posted 35 MPH as at present. Would necessitate signing entrances to the City of 25 MPH.

The first recommendation was then reviewed. Turner re-appeared and depicted this entire area from 10th to 5th Street on Boulevard and the fact that, because of the various school facilities on both side of Boulevard this portion of that street received substantial pedestrian traffic. It was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that this recommendation be approved. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried. At the suggestion of Councilman Erickson, Turner agreed to contact the petitioners, to give them the benefit of the thinking which prompted this recommendation.

The second recommendation was then considered. Asked for comment, the Police Chief said that, in the opinion of the Traffic Safety Committee taking into consideration all factors including traffic count, 17th and Woodruff is more qualified for a warrant than 17th and St. Clair or at least will be when Woodruff is developed south of 17th. Councilman Erickson expressed strong opposition to taking this type of action as recommended on 17th and Woodruff and doing nothing at the intersection of 17th and St. Clair siting, for purposes of illustration, the fact that St. Clair does presently, extend south of 17th; the fact that there is a serious sight problem at St. Clair; and the fact that, even if a traffic light is installed at Woodruff, there would still be heavy pedestrian traffic caused by students at St. Clair, the latter argument being based on the theory that school children wouldn't be prone to walk one long block east, just to take advantage of a traffic light. Erickson noted that Woodruff, south of 17th, would not be developed for 2 to 3 years and meanwhile, the situation at St. Clair is bound to get progressively more serious. He said it didn't seem necessary to have someone killed at 17th and St. Clair before corrective action was taken. Councilman Freeman concurred but noted that there might be a problem installing a traffic light at St. Clair, inasmuch as the State is involved. It was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that a traffic engineering study be made at the intersection of 17th and St. Clair to determine priority and the qualifications for a warrant for a traffic signal light. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

It was then moved by Councilman Karst, seconded by Freeman, that the recommendation pertaining to 17th and Woodruff be tabled, pending the results of the study just ordered. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

With reference to recommendation No. 3 having to do with a traffic light at First and Woodruff, it was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that this proposal be approved. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, one; carried.

Pertaining to the recommendation for a 4-way STOP at the intersection of 7th Street and Tiger Avenue, it was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that this be approved. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

The recommendation to deny a request for a 4-way STOP at the intersection of Jefferson and Elva was then studied. It was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that this recommendation be upheld and this request be denied. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

Likewise, it was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that the request for a 4-way STOP at Emerson and Garfield be denied. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

The request for angle parking on the west side of Memorial Drive from South Temple to E. Street was then considered. The Police Chief noted that this would be in conflict with the present master plan for Memorial Drive. It was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that this request also be denied. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

With reference to the request from the School District to attach School Bus Stop signs on certain street sign poles, it was moved by Councilman Wood, seconded by Freeman, that this request be granted. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

Finally, recommendation No. 9 was presented. This was a proposal for the adoption of an ordinance pertaining to 25 mile speed limits within the City and signing all entrances to the City. It was moved by Councilman Freeman, seconded by Wood, that this be referred to the City Attorney for study and recommendation. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

Reference is made to page 24 in this book of minutes and, more specifically, a request by the Off-Street Parking Association for a variance to construct a light frame building on the White Star Laundry Parking Lot. Councilman Gesas reported that he has been informed that the revised plan now is to construct a butler building at this location

which would qualify under the Fire 1 Zone. It was moved by Councilman Gesas, seconded by Wood, that this request for a variance, therefore, be denied. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

Councilman Freeman relayed a request from Kennaday Paving Company for a time extension; due to inclement weather, for completion of the Clair E. Gail Tennis Courts Project. It was moved by Councilman Freeman, seconded by Erickson, that this request be granted. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried.

Freeman then relayed a request from Homer Biggers for a time extension, due to inclement weather, on the Tautphaus Park Sprinkling System Project. It was moved by Councilman Freeman, seconded by Erickson, that this request be denied. Roll call as follows: Ayes, 6; No, none; carried,

There being no further business, it was moved by Councilman Gesas, seconded by Erickson, that the meeting adjourn at 9:55 P.M., carried.
